how it works

As a Pack member who has chosen to participate in this fundraising challenge, you will nominate individuals on campus to get pied in the face. This could be your professor, coach, or best friend. Then, you will raise funds through donations to secure your spot in the "Pie if Forward" event. The top five fundraisers in each Pack will get to pie their nominated individual(s) at a "Pie it Forward" celebration hosted by your Pack.

IDEAS FOR RAISING MONEY

We understand that fundraising can feel overwhelming. Here are three tips to help:

1. Personalize Your Message: Share why you're passionate about supporting children with cancer. Let others know how they can make a meaningful impact.

2. Raising money on campus:

Show up to your dining hall, sporting events, campus union and share about PSF.

Print out your custom QR code and hand them out.

Do a raffle. Ask people to donate for a chance to participate in your messy event in a special way. Do

they get to pie their favorite faculty member? Maybe they win a free pizza that you get donated! Be creative in their prizes.

3. Utilize Social Media

Spread the word on social. Share your fundraising progress, heartwarming stories, and updates about upcoming events. Don't forget to tag us @ pinkyswearfoudnationpack and use the hashtag #CancerlsMessy.

4. Ask for supplies

Ask Target, Walmart, or local businesses to donate the supplies you need to get messy. (Or a gift card to buy those supplies!)



PLAN YOUR EVENT:

4 WEEKS BEFORE THE EVENT

- Set a date and secure a location on campus
- Set up your fundraising page
- Nomimate and get consent from the person you want to pie

3 WEEKS BEFORE THE EVENT

- Start fundraising! Ask people to donate to YOUR Fundraise Up page so that your nominee will get pied.
- Begin promoting your event on campus: give out swag, hand out fliers, post on social.
- Set up tables with donation jars showcasing your nominee. Convince people why YOUR nominee should be pied and ask them to donate.

2 WEEKS BEFORE THE EVENT

- Make sure you and your Pack have all the materials you need to get messy.
- Commit to asking 20 people to donate \$25 this week.

 Continue promoting your event and inviting peers to come to the mess event.

DAY OF EVENT:

- GET MESSY and SHARE IT! Don't forget to use the hashtag #CancerlsMessy and tag Pinky Swear Foundation Pack
- Announce how much you raised as a group, share Mitch's story to attendees.
- Invite new people to join The Pack!

BONUS:

During your event, invite your fellow college students to join in on the fun!

Charge a set fee for others to pie their friends in the face. It's a win-win situation – they get to have a blast, and you'll be raising even more money for kids with cancer. Let's turn the fun into funds!



OTHER WAYS TO GET MESSY:
